Assistant professor (Ph.D.) in the Institute of Design at SWPS University of Social Sciences and Humanities and the University of Warsaw. Interested in interdisciplinary work combining the humanities and social sciences with design and artistic practices, both in terms of research and teaching. Graduate of archaeology and ethnology, Ph.D. degree in arts. Her current research focuses on the anthropology of manufacture and the resulting understanding and knowledge: skills, body knowledge, materials and processes; traditions of manufacture and material heritage. She also deals with reflection on art, especially the social construction of folk and primitive arts, as well as materiality and the valuation of things regarded as design, art, a monument, museum artefacts.

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Adam Mickiewicz University, Poznań

Art historian, associate professor (prof. UAM dr hab.), director of the Art History Institute at Adam Mickiewicz University in Poznań, Poland. Specialist in the field of living architecture, the culture of housing, design history and interior design, urban issues and also German-Polish art and cultural relationship.
